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#### **INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT**

To the Board of Directors of **MotorCities National Heritage Area Partnership, Inc.** 

#### **Report on the Financial Statements**

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of MotorCities National Heritage Area Partnership Inc. (a Nonprofit Organization), which comprise the statements of financial position as of September 30, 2017 and 2016, and the related statements of activities and changes in net assets and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

#### Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

#### **Auditor's Responsibility**

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits. We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audits to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

#### **Opinion**

#### Note 1 - Nature of Organization and Significant Accounting Policies

#### Nature of Organization

MotorCities National Heritage Area Partnership, Inc. (the "Organization") is a Michigan non-profit corporation dedicated to preserving, interpreting, and promoting Michigan's automotive and labor heritage. The Partnership is the authorized management and coordinating entity for the Heritage Area. The Partnership, in cooperation with the State of Michigan, other local and governmental entities, the private and non-profit sectors and local communities in Michigan, empowers communities in Michigan to conserve their automotive heritage while strengthening future economic opportunities; and conserve, interpret and develop the historical, cultural, natural and recreational resources related to the MotorCities National Heritage Area.

#### Classification of Net Assets

The Organization's net assets are categorized and reported as follows:

<u>Unrestricted Net Assets</u> - This portion of the Organization's net assets is available for general obligations and is not subject to any donor imposed restrictions. Revenues earned from unrestricted contributions, investment income available for general operations and all operating expenses are reported in this category.

<u>Temporarily Restricted Net Assets</u> - This portion of the Organization's net assets is limited to uses specified by donor-imposed restrictions. When donor restrictions expire, or the nature and purpose of the restriction is accomplished, temporarily restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions.

<u>Permanently Restricted Net Assets</u> - This portion of the Organization's net assets is limited by donor-imposed restrictions which require that the gift be maintained in perpetuity. The Organization did not receive or hold any permanently restricted net assets during 2017.

#### Note 1 - Nature of Organization and Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

#### Revenues and Cost Recognition

The financial statements of the Organization have been prepared on the accrual basis in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles as applied to non-profit organizations. The Organization recognizes all revenues derived from grants, unconditional promises to give and fundraising events in the period of the grant, promise to give or fundraising activity occurs. Costs related to these revenues are recorded as incurred.

#### In-kind Donations, Donated Materials and Services

The Organization derives benefits from the use of donated materials, professional services and other services from volunteers from time-to-time. During the fiscal years ended September 30, 2017 and 2016, the fair value of these donated materials and services amounted to \$514,821 and \$630,115, respectively. In 2017, the total donated materials and services were allocated to tourism, revitalization, interpretation and education (Program Services), and management and general (Supporting Services) by approximately 3%, 60%, 37%, and 8%, respectively. In 2016, the total donated materials and services were allocated to tourism, revitalization, interpretation and education (Program Services), and management and general (Supporting Services) by approximately 5%, 78%, 9%, and 8%, respectively.

#### **Income Taxes**

The Organization is a not-for-profit organization that is exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

#### Cash

At times, the cash balances held at financial institutions were in excess of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) insurance limits. Total cash balances are insured by the FDIC up to \$250,000 per bank. At September 30, 2017 and 2016, the Organization had approximately \$504,500 and \$-0-, respectively, in excess of the FDIC limits.

#### Grants and Other Receivables

The Organization receives grants on an annual basis from various local, state, federal and other funding sources. Certain grants are funded on a reimbursement basis which can lead to a grant receivable amount at the Organization's year end. Grants and other receivables that are deemed uncollectible are written-off in the period that determination is made. No allowance for doubtful accounts is considered necessary at September 30, 2017 and 2016, respectively.

#### Furniture and Equipment

Furniture and equipment are stated at cost, or if donated, at fair market value at the date of the donation. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful life of the asset. Expenditures for maintenance and repairs are charged to expense when incurred, unless that expense improves a pre-existing unit of property and is deemed significant by management, in which case the amount would be capitalized and depreciated using the straight-line method over the estimated useful life of the improvement.

#### Allocation of Functional Expenses

Direct and indirect costs have been allocated between program and general and administrative based on estimates from management. Although the methods of allocation used are considered appropriate, other methods could be used that would produce different amounts.

Total functional expenses amounted to \$1,034,749 and \$1,207,232 for the years ended September 30, 2017 and 2016, respectively. Approximately 92% of these costs are attributed to program services and 8% of these costs are attributed to supporting services for the years ended September 30, 2017 and 2016.

#### Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### **Current Vulnerability**

Due to certain concentrations, approximately 89% of the Organization's non-in-kind revenues were provided through federal contracts.

#### Subsequent Events

The financial statements and related disclosures include evaluation of events up through and including February 14, 2018, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

#### **Note 4 - Lease Commitments**

The Organization is responsible for the operating expenses on a month-to-month basis, which amounts to approximately \$1,700 per month. The Organization has recognized \$18,092 for the use of the facilities, including operating expenses and \$18,000 for parking as in-kind donation revenues and expenses during the year ended September 30, 2017 under this agreement.

The Organization entered into a three year lease with General Electric for the use of a copier in April of 2015. The monthly payment due for the lease is \$205. Below is a breakdown of the required future minimum lease payments by year:

#### Note 5 - Related Party

The Organization has a cooperative agreement with the National Parks Service that provides substantially all of its federal funding. This agreement has been extended through September 30, 2021; however, the amount of funding is to be determined on an annual basis.

In addition, the Organization may reach their funding cap by September 30, 2020, depending on congressional appropriations. The Organization has begun working with members of Congress to resolve this.

The Organization receives a substantial amount of its support from federal and state government sources. A significant reduction in the level of this support, if it were to occur, could have a material effect on certain programs of the Organization.

#### Note 6 - Restricted Cash

The Organization maintains funds for various Stewardship Communities. These funds are held by the Organization until authorization is received from the Chief Steward of each community to release the funds. The amounts as of September 30, 2017 and 2016 held for Stewardship Communities amounted to \$8,661 and \$18,437, respectively.

The Organization has received donated funds toward the Highway Sign Project. The restricted balance as of September 30, 2017 and 2016 was \$4,917 and \$-0-, respectively.

The Organization also acts as a fiscal agent for a coalition of other non-profit organizations (the Coalition) relating to the Fort Street Bridge Interpretive Park project. The Organization maintains these custodial funds for payment to the Coalition to purchase items related to the highway park project. These amounts are held in escrow, with a corresponding liability recorded until the date that such funds are released by the Organization for their intended purpose. The balance at September 30, 2017 and 2016 was \$276,937 and \$-0-, respectively.
